Becoming Copyright Aware


Technology makes it easier than ever to reproduce, create and communicate content. This ease of production and reproduction means we must all be aware of our rights and responsibilities as content creators and content consumers.

Traditional Copyright



Work cannot be used, adapted, copied or published without the owner's permission.

Creative Commons



Work may be used without permission but only in accordance with the rules set by the licence.

Public Domain



Work can be used, adapted, copied and published completely without restrictions, no permission needed.

All original work is protected under copyright when it is created.

Work that the creators have chosen to licence under Creative Commons

Copyright expires 70 years after the death of the creator or date of publication. Some work is immediately placed in the Public Domain.


